The 1921 Newfoundland general census enumeration for South River, Newfoundland (page 108 section 161/171) lists the Morgan family as follows: Wilfred 32, Violet 23, daughter Clarice is 2 (born 1919). It appears that they are living with Wilfred's parents Benjamin 67 and Emiline 67.

Wilfred is working as a fisherman and like his father, Benjamin, plied the Labrador cod fishery.

At the next general census in 1935, the family is still living in South River. Wilfred is 45, Violet 39, Clarice 16, Pauline 10, Jean 7, Ida 5 and Emiline is 81

The 1945 census does not contain a listing for Clarice. This is because she has enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) and has been serving during the war, rising to the rank of LAW or Leading Air Woman.. This year, 1945, in fact June 2nd, she married Frederick Frank Pelletier.

The Pelletier's had five (5) children, Carol, Frederick, Valerie, Raymond, and Jennifer. The family moved to Lacolle, QC in 1945 and stayed for 2 year's and then moved to Hemmingford, QC where they owned and ran an apple orchard. Frederick worked for Immigration Canada at the nearby Border Crossing. Clarice and Frederick had a winter home in Fort Pierce, Florida, but Hemmingsford was always their home. Frederick died in Florida in 1980 and is buried in his hometown of Hemmingford.

Clarice died at her home in 2005 at the age of 85 and is buried beside Frederick.

SOUTH RIVER, March 25—
Quite recently the people of South
River, Salmon Cove, Clarke's
Beach and North River had the
great pleasure of welcoming home
the following members of the arm-
ed forces; Miss Clarice Morgan,
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred
Morgan of South River, now a
leading air woman in the R.C.A.
F., as well as Seamen George
Atkins of North River, Alphonsus
Long also of North River and Geo.
Dunn of South River. This was
Clarice's first visit to her home
for sometime and her family and
friends were very pleased to see
her once more. Apart from a pub-
lic reception under the auspices
of the W.P.A., held in the school
which she attended before leav-
ing home, several other receptions
in houses were given in her hon-
our and the fortnight's furlough
seemed to pass all too quickly.
Clarice, being the only girl from
here in the forces naturally evok-
ed much favourable comment par-
ticularly on her trim appearance
in air force blue and everyone vied
with each other in helping her
to enjoy her leave.

Welcoming speeches were also made by Revs. Sparshott and Williams also Major Kennedy of the S.A. as well as other members of the N.P.A. The speeches were interspersed with songs and recitations by Miss Betty Long, Miss Eilleen Reid and some school pupils of South River. After this teas were served by the ladies of the W.P.A. and dancing was indulged in until 2 a.m. Seaman Jim Delaney of Bay Roberts a comrade of Geo. Atkins was also present, who being rather a "jolly" fellow, helped the affair to be all the more enjoyed. A presentation in the form of a generous gift of money was then made to Leading Air Woman C. Morgan and Geo. Atkins as well as a gift of \$5.00 to Seaman Deaney. This coupled with the best wishes of Mrs. Fred Hussey, President of the W.P.A., was much appreciated by the guests, who replied in a few words thanking everybody for their part in making the affair so enjoyable.
