The 1921 Newfoundland general census shows Clifford at nine (9) years old and the eldest of three (3) children in the Russell household at Coley's Point. Mary at 6 and Gwendolyn at 5 are his two younger sisters.

The 1935 census of Coley's Point lists William at age 52, Blanche at 48 and three children at home, Mary 20, Gwendolyn at 19 and Ellen at 12. Clifford is found at age 23 living in the home of John and Mary Thorne of Russell-town, Bonavista. He is a lodger in their home.

At 28 years old, Clifford is a crew member of the SS Belle Isle. The ship left St. John's,

Newfoundland and arrived New York City on January 25th, 1940. It seems he was engaged (hired) as of December 1939.

Clifford enlisted in the Royal Naval Reserve of Newfoundland sometime in early 1940. This date is a best guess scenario since he was part of the 5th Naval Contingent to ship overseas from Newfoundland. This contingent departed St. John's on board the HMHS Newfoundland on March 7th, 1940, and arrived Liverpool, England April 1st, 1940.

The Newfoundland was a British Royal Mail Ship that was requisitioned as a hospital ship in the World War II. She was sunk in 1943 in a Luftwaffe attack off southern Italy.

1945 sees Clifford now 33, back home living in Coley's Point with his parents, William and Blanche who are 62 and 58, respectively. At home too is Mary 37, Gwendolyn 29, and Ellen 23. Clifford is working as a bank clerk.

This is where the trail ends with regard to Clifford since no other record on him has been found to date.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Russell, of Coley's Point recently received a letter from their son Clifford P. Russell, who is serving overseas in the Royal Navy. Clifford has been promoted to the rank of Leading Seaman. He went overseas with the fifth naval draft and immediately went on active service. He is in excellent health and is enjoying life in the Navy. He receives The Guardian regularly and both he and his shipmates enjoy reading it very much.

CLIFFORD P. RUSSELL RECEIVES PROMOTION

Sub. Lieut. Clifford P. Russell of Coley's Point, who for the past two and a half years has been serving with His Majesties Forces overseas, recently was advised by the Admiralty that he had been promoted to the rank of Lieutenant in the Royal Navy. The promotion was effective as from July 16th, which happened to be Clifford's birthday.
