Parents: William and Flora May (nee House) Parsons.

Although born in St. John's, David was raised in Bay Roberts by his aunt and grandparents. David's mother, Flora, died in 1920 making this scenario a necessity for a single dad at the time.

The 1921 Newfoundland general census for St. John's East shows William age 38, a widower with a young son David who is 2 years old. William's wife, Flora died a year earlier in 1920.

Unable to care for David properly, William made arrangements to send David to Bay Roberts to live

with his parents, William and Dorcas. Since his parents were aged, William's sister Rachael Fanny did much of the child rearing, becoming more of David's mom than an aunt.

David enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1940 and served until 1945. He is not found in the Newfoundland Military Records since he enlisted from Nova Scotia where he was studying/working at the time.

David married Elizabeth Gladys "Betty" Christian of St. John's, Newfoundland in November of 1947. Betty was a teacher who had attended Memorial University of Newfoundland. Together they had three children, all boys, Jim, John, and Peter.

"Betty" died in 2009 at the age of 91, while David passed in 2013 at 93. They are buried in the Riverbank Cemetery, Hantsport, Nova Scotia, Canada.

PARSONS, David Ralph — 93 of Hantsport, Hants Co., passed away peacefully Friday, January 4, 2013, as he had wished to do, at home in the comforts of his own surroundings. Born in St. John's, N.L., he was a son of the late William Ralph and Flora May (House) Parsons. David was brought up in Bay Roberts, N.L., by his aunt, Miss F. Parsons. David was part of the R.C.A.F. serving from 1940-1945 and he was a member of Lucknow Branch, No. 109 of the Royal Canadian Legion, Hantsport. He graduated from Nova Scotia Technical College in 1950, and he worked for Minas Basin Pulp and Power as an Engineer for 30 years. David was also a member of St. Andrew's Anglican Church, Hantsport and was a former warden. He was predeceased by his wife of 61 years, Elizabeth G. (Christian); a brother in infancy and a grandson.

RECEPTION FOR RETURNED MEN

On Tuesday night at the Public Building a reception was held under the auspices of the W.P.A. for the following: F. Lt. David Parsons, RCAF; Gunner Warren Bradbury, R.A.; Sergt. Ray Keefe, RCAF; Gunner Reg. Mercer, R.A.; Gunner Herbert Bowering, R.A.; LAC David Sparkes, RCAF.

There was a very large number present—the largest gathering seen at a reception for a long time.

Just previously to the opening of the proceedings Japan's unconditional surrender was announced from London and this fact added to the joyousness of the occasion.

Mr. Ralph Parsons was the chairman and he was assisted by Mr. E. V. Hall, who led the community singing. Solos were rendered by Miss M. Fitzpatrick and Mr. John Pitt. Miss H. Norman gave a recitation. Addresses of welcome were made by Revs. Torrville and Pitt, and Major Pike, S.A.

Mrs. T. J. Pitt, Vice-President of the Bay Roberts W.P.A., in the regrettable absence of the President, Miss R. F. Parsons, in a brief address welcomed the men and made the customary presentations. Refreshments were then served.

Arrangements had been made to welcome others but they were unavoidably absent.
