Born in Brigus in 1920, Douglas was the first child of Ernest and Alice Hall. The 1921 Newfoundland general census shows Douglas then one (1) as the only entry as child for parents Ernest and Alice. The Halls appear to be quite well off as they have a live in domestic Sarah Dawe in their employ. She is just fourteen (14) years old.

By the time of the 1935 census, the family has moved to the neighbouring town of Bay Roberts, where Ernest is reportedly working as manager of the local bank, and the family has now increased to include Angus (Gus) and Helen. Another child Silvia came along later. Douglas is now twenty-three (23).

As World War II military service records are not available to the general public, it is rather difficult to give an accurate account of Douglas' service. What is known is that he enlisted in the RAF (Royal Air Force) sometime early in the 1940's.

A 1943 notation in the UK London Gazette supplement number 36223 page 4723, dated 26 Oct 1943 provides information that Douglas had been promoted to Sergeant (Sgt) on 21 June 1943.

Another piece of information is found having to do with the M/T (motor tanker) Kaldfonn on escort duty from Clyde, Scotland to New York USA arriving on 09 Aug 1944. Douglas is on that ship as a radio operator. The M/T Kaldfonn is part of the Norwegian Merchant Fleet. It provided escort to tankers in a convoy HX-304 then from New York to Mersey, England. The Kaldfonn was armed with sixty (60) depth charges.

Douglas married Florence (Florie) Mary Burt on 02 December 1944 in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Together they built a life in British Columbia and had two (2) children, David and Steve.

Florence passed away on May 31<sup>st</sup>, 1997, at age 76 in Parksville, British Columbia. Her and Douglas had been married for fifty-two years. Douglas passed in November 2003 at age eighty-three (83) in Parksville, Nanaimo, British Columbia
