

George William Thompson World War I Royal Canadian Navy Service No. 1542 Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) Service No. 775X

Born: 18 Feb 1881

Place of Birth: Bay Roberts

Parents: George and Annie Thompson

George enlisted in the Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) in the summer of 1914, he was in his early thirties (33) at the time.

His four years and eight months of service saw him assigned to several British ships, several months service in the Royal Canadian Navy and wounded in action on 12 Aug 1915.


The official entries contained in his Service Ledger Record are as follows:

- 1. 07 Aug 14 18 Nov 14: **HMS Calypso** (Training Vessel)
- 2. 19 Nov 14 28 Jun 15: **HMS Vivid** 1
- 3. 29 Jun 15 06 Feb 16: HMS Grafton 12 Aug 1915: Wounded in action while serving on the Grafton.

- 4. 07 Feb 09 Apr 16: **HMS Vivid 1** Promoted to leading seaman.
- 5. 10 Apr 16 04 May 16 & 05 May 16 31 Jan 17: **HMS Princess**

6. 01 Feb 17 – 10 Apr 17: **HMS Hyacinth**

- 7. 11 Apr 17 02 Nov 17: **HMS Vivid** 111
- 8. 06 Nov 17 20 Jan 18: **HMS Briton**

Transferred to the RCN (Royal Canadian Navy). Assigned service No. 1542.

- 9. 24 Jan 18 31 Jul 18: **HMCS Niobe**
- 10. 01 Aug 18 21 Dec 18: HMCS Seagull
- 11. 21 Dec 18 25 Dec 18: HMCS Niobe

Transferred back to the Royal Navy.

12. 26 Dec 18 – 08 Apr 19: **HMS Briton,** demobilized and discharged.

Out of service, George is found in the 1921 general Newfoundland census married and living in Coley's Point. George and his wife Victoria have five (5) children.

By 1935, George, now 54 and Victoria 47 have a family of eight (8) children.

The 1945 census of Newfoundland shows George (62) and Victoria (57) still living in Coley's Point with five (5) children at home with them. George passed away in May 1957 and Victoria in September 1961. They are buried in the Salvation Army Cemetery at Coley's Point.

While looking through some old artifacts at the Branch (Branch 32 of the Royal Canadian Legion, Bay Roberts), the item on the next page came to light and it makes a unique addition to the biography for George, WW I Veteran. It is provided as an accurate representation of what these sailors experienced. Below is a clipping from The Bay Roberts Guardian dated 05 Nov 1915.

Through the courtesy of Commander MacDermott of H.M.S. Calypse, we have raceived the fellowing copy of a letter from the Royal Naval Medical Information Bureau, Malta Branch, viz:— R. N. Hospital,

Malta, 30th Sept., 1915. Sir,—George Thompson, R.N.R.

H.M.S. Grafton, was admitted to the Lospital on 17th August, suffering from shell wounds in the head. He made a good recovery, and was discharged cured on 9th September.

A letter was sent to his wife, giving news of his admission and the nature and condition of his wounds; this is done in the case of every wounded man brought to this hospital, by the R. N. Friendly Union of Sailers' Wives.
