John's father, Alexander, was born in Scotland. He had spent time in the British Army, having enlisted in the Royal Engineers in 1908. At that time 17-year-old Alexnader gave his occupation as "telegraphist."

This more than likely provides reason why he was in Bay Roberts in 1916. He was working for the Cable Company, in what is now a national historic building, locally referred to the "The Cable Building."

During his time in Bay Roberts, he met Violet Lillian Parsons, and they were married in March 1916. The couple had four children: Margaret born 1917, John born 1918, Francis born 1919 and Nelson 1924.

By 1931, the family has now relocated to Nova Scotia. Work related is probably the best guess. John is now 12 years old.

By 1941, John, is at university at Dalhousie and later McGill. During this time, 1941, John has enlisted in the Canadian Army, more specifically; he is a RCEME or a member of the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.

In December of the same year, Lieutenant John A. Gordon married Mildred Sterns in a ceremony at Montreal, Quebec.

John served in the Canadian Army until his release at the end of the war. On the 15<sup>th</sup> of December 1945, he was awarded the MBE Medal (Member of the British Empire).

"MBE stands for Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire. It is the third highest ranking Order of the British Empire award, behind CBE and then OBE.

Captain John Abraham Gordon, MBE, RCEME

RCEME Staff Officer, Headquarters, RCA, 4 Canadian Armoured Division

Citation: Capt Gordon has served the RCA of 4 Canadian Armoured Division throughout the whole of its period in action in NW Europe. Until the end of 1944, he was officer commanding 104 LAD supporting 23 Canadian Field Regiment (SP), RCA, and from that time until the cessation of hostilities he served as RCEME staff officer with HQ RCA, 4 Canadian Armoured Division. In both capacities, he has shown unremitting energy in the heavy and vital responsibilities of ensuring that the SP and towed guns, tanks and vehicles of this highly mechanized formation have been kept in action wherever possible. While with the SP [self-propelled] regiment, particularly during the phase of the pursuit across France and Belgium into Holland in 1944, these duties were particularly arduous and were always discharged with great perseverance beyond the normal call of duty and with first class technical skill. The most difficult of recovery jobs were all in the day's work. While with HQ RCA, he displayed these same qualities in the wider field and his advice and leadership were of great assistance to the regiment's RCEME officers.

Capt Gordon has made an important contribution towards keeping the Artillery "fighting fit", by his untiring devotion to duty.

Together, John and Mildred had three children and lived in Nova Scotia. Tragedy struck in July 1951 when John passed away at the age of 32 following complications from appendicitis surgery. He is buried in Haliburton Cemetery, Pictou County, Nova Scotia.
