



Nathaniel Morgan

Nathaniel, a 19-year-old schoolteacher by occupation enlisted in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment on the 21st of June 1918. Physically Nathaniel was 5 feet 5 inches in height, had brown eyes and weighed 134 lbs.

The service record for Pte. Morgan is scanty at best but from the entries, it can be learned that he enlisted on 21 June 1918 and was discharged on 3 August 1919, a period of 1 year 2 months.

In trying to follow Pte. Morgan, it is found that he embarked St. John's on the S.S. Columbella to Halifax on 22nd July 1918. From there he went overseas, since there is an incidental notation mentioning Hazeley Down Camp, England September 5th, 1918, in his file.

He was shipped back to Newfoundland in June 1919 and arrived on July 1st, 1919. He demobilized and discharged a month later.

Back in civilian life, Nathaniel is found in the 1921 census records living at home with parents, William and May and two other of their children, Abram and Elizabeth.

There the trail ends with regard to all records accessed but, it would appear he is found buried at St. John the Evangelist Cemetery at Coleys Point, Nathaniel having died in 1950 and wife Emma Jane in 1987

Please Note: The presenting of the final resting place of veteran Nathaniel Morgan may or may not be correct but after extensive and exhaustive research it is likely the best possibility found as of the writing of this biography.
