Raymond was born in a large family in 1925. According to the 1935 Newfoundland general census, the Keefe household at Coley's Point, Bay Roberts totaled 14 people. There were grandparents Peter 83 and Mary Jane 72. Augustus 46 and wife Ethel 38 and children; Ada 16, Gwendolyn

14, Allan (nephew) 12, Mary 12, Raymond 10, Irene 8, Elsa 6, Irving 5, Calvin 3, and Ethel 1.

Raymond enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force or RCAF in the early days of the war and was released from active service on 28 April 1946. He would rise to the rank of S/Sgt during his years in the Air Force.

He married Dorothy Mae Dewling of St. John's, Newfoundland in 1950 and together they had three (3) children of record.

When Raymond passed away at Dartmouth, Nova Scotia in 2009, he and Dorothy were married for 59 years. Dorothy passed away two (2) years later. Both were cremated.





Raymond Augustus Keefe was born in Coley's Point, Newfoundland, and joined the Royal Air Force in 1943 during World War II. He served as a Wireless Operator and Air Gunner on Consolidated B-24 Liberator aircraft. In June 1944, LAC Keefe was sent to #3 Wireless Training School in Winnipeg, Manitoba, where he received training as a Wireless Operator until November of the same year. He was then promoted to Sergeant and sent to #7 Bombing and Gunnery School in Paulson, Manitoba, from December 1944 to January 1945 to train as an Air Gunner. In May 1945, Sgt. Keefe was sent to #5 Operational Training Unit in Boundary Bay, British Columbia, for air gunner training and

practice exercises. He finished his training at #5 Operational Training Unit in Abbotsford, British Columbia, in July 1945, where he trained on Consolidated B-24 Liberators and North American Mitchells.

Sgt. Keefe's logbook also includes his Royal Air Force Service and Release Record Book SAM2015.0009.002. The service book certifies that Sgt. Keefe served with the Royal Air Force (RAF) from 19 November 1943 to 21 January 1946 and was granted 81 days of leave on release.





Here is a copy of the obituary of Raymond as published in the local newspaper at the time:

83. Passed away May 4, 2009, at Camphill Veteran's Memorial Hospital. Born in Coley's Point, Newfoundland to the late Gus and Ethel (Rose) Keefe and later of St. John's, Newfoundland. Ray moved to Dartmouth with his family in 1968. Ray was a Sergeant in the RAF during WWII acting as wireless operator and Air Gunner on B-52s and was released from active duty on

April 28, 1946. His working career led him to the position of Regional Manager for Superior Propane which saw a move to Moncton for five years until his retirement in 1989 when he returned to Dartmouth. Ray was a member of the Dartmouth Curling Club and also enjoyed bowling and lawn bowling.

A man to whom family meant everything, left to mourn are his loving wife of 59 years, Dorothy (Dewling), daughter Lynn Gracewood (Pictou), son Greg Keefe and wife Theresa, daughter Donna Gaudet, all of Dartmouth, grandchildren: Fred Gracewood, Dr. Lorri Beatty (Shawn), John Gaudet (Ashley Beckwith), Jason Keefe (Amanda Waldic), Amanda Gaudet (Graham Clements), great-grandchildren: Miguel Rodgers, Kylie Clements and Hunter Raymond Keefe, sisters: Jeanette Keefe (Brampton), Gwen Miles (St. John's), and Elsa Batten (Roy) (Edmonton). He was predeceased by sisters: Ada Fontain (Jim), Mary Dawe (Bill), Rene Havaaldsen (Nels), Marina Dawe (Mackie), Edith Ryan (Bill), brothers: Irving Keefe (Phyllis), and Calvin Keefe (Edna), a sister and brother in infancy.
